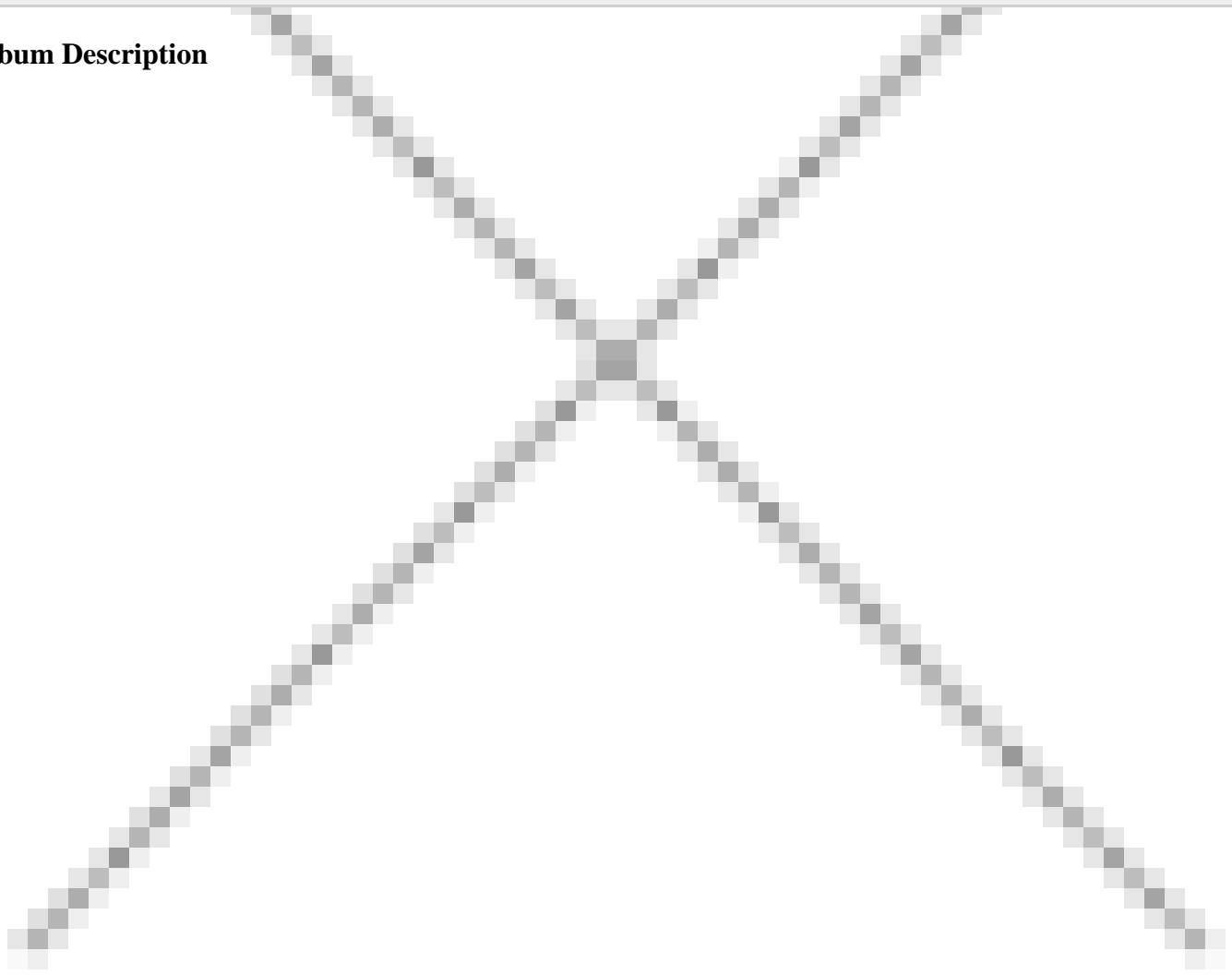

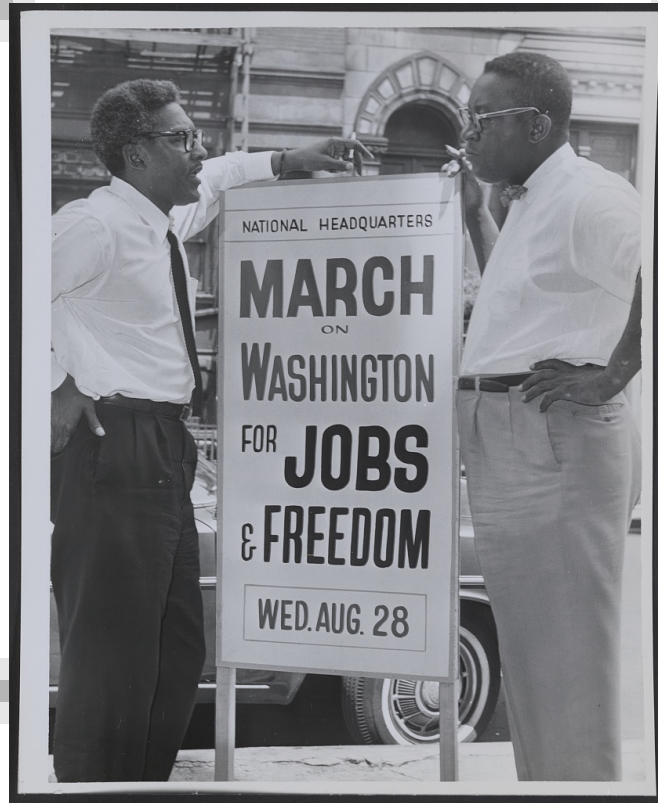

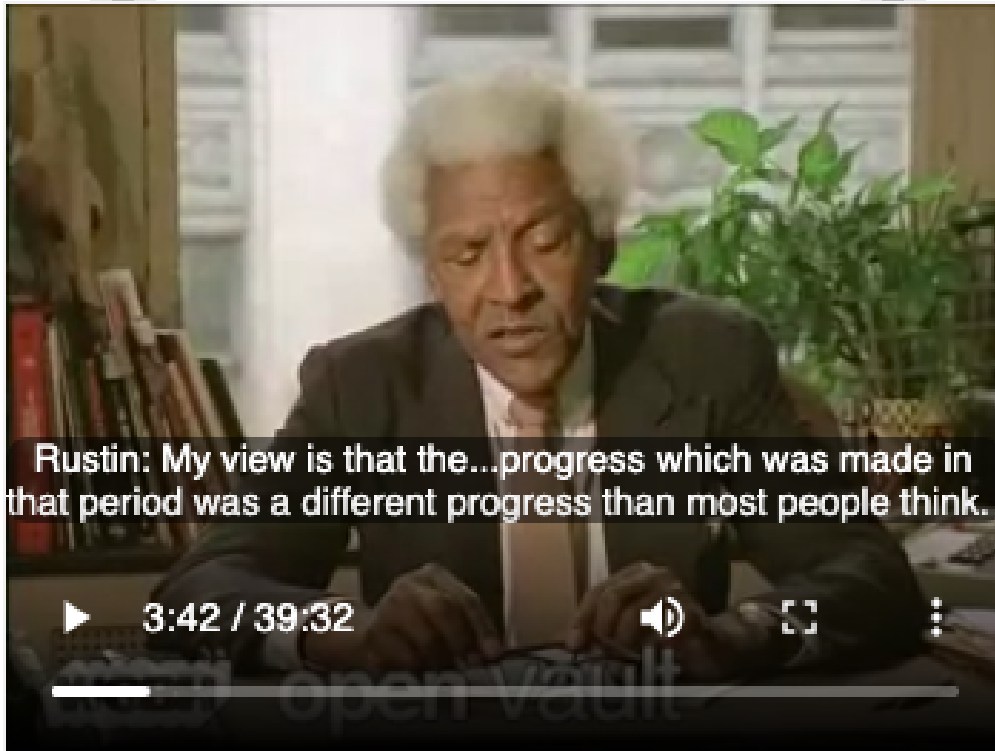

Kennedy Is Denounced By Rights March Deputy

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J. Oct. 9 (AP).—Bayard Rustin, deputy director of the August 28 civil rights march on Washington, says President Kennedy is "trying to put a stop to the only methods that work for Negroes."

Mr. Rustin, speaking last night at a Rutgers University and Douglas College rally for Donald S. Harris, a Rutgers graduate imprisoned in Americus, Ga., said that President Kennedy is trying to slow the Negro fight for equality, "since this is an election year."

headed by Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy, is attempting to keep the Negro quiet. Mr. Rustin did not say how this was done.

Mr. Rustin said of President Kennedy, "He has been appointing judge after judge in the South who will obstruct justice." Mr. Rustin did not specify which judges he had in mind.

Mr. Rustin, 54, of New York, received a standing ovation when he finished his 45-minute address. The rally was attended by 1,800 persons.

Legislators Invited to Talk To Aug. 28 March Groups

Senators and Representatives from all 50 States will be invited to address delegations from their areas who will visit here August 28 to participate in the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom.

"There will be meetings at each one of the 50 State assembly locations so the marchers can meet with their respective Congressmen and Senators who will have been invited to meet with the delegations," Bayard Rustin, deputy director of the demonstration, announced today in New York

NAACP, William Moore of CORE and Herbert Lee of SNCC and the thousands of nameless heroes of the freedom movement who have given their lives in the struggle for full equality," Mr. Rustin disclosed. "The one song which will be sung on the march is 'We Shall Overcome.'"

Participating Groups Limited

Only four types of organizations can participate officially in the march, Mr. Rustin emphasized. He identified them as civil rights, labor, church and fraternal groups.

150,000 Now Expected In Rights March Here

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Leaders of the August 28 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom announced today that "an assemblage larger than we had anticipated" has forced several major changes in the conduct of the demonstration.

March on Washington officials indicated that they are expecting 150,000 whites and Negroes to participate in the demonstration. Previously they had announced that at least 100,000 persons would visit Washington for the one-day march.

The major change announced by A. Philip Randolph, national chairman of the march, is that the demonstrators will assemble at the Washington Monument grounds when they arrive in the Dis-

shals who will maintain order among the demonstrators, said it required 95 minutes for 50 of his men to walk the original route of the march yesterday. This trial run apparently was one reason for changing the route.

The route of the march has been changed also.

Former Communist Heading March On Washington, D. C.

New York, N. Y. Aug. 19—
The man selected by A. Phillip Randolph to plan, organize, and direct the March on Washington is one, Bayard Rustin, a onetime member of the young Communist League of America.

According to well informed sources, Rustin, who is 53 has made a career of being a militant pacifist. As a student at New York's City College, he had joined the young Com-

Until recently he was executive secretary of the War Resisters League. For five years he was Martin Luther King's secretary, and in 1947 organized the first freedom ride on a southern bus.

He had studied the Gandhi movement in India for a year and a half and sat beside Nehru at the first meeting of India's Congress Party, worked with Nkrumah in Ghana before and after the country's independ-

Never a Communist, March Leader Says

NEW YORK, Aug. 16 (AP).—Bayard Rustin, deputy director of the planned August 28 civil rights march on Washington, said today he once had been a member of the Young Communist League but never was a Communist.

Senator Thurmond, Democrat of South Carolina, had said Tuesday that Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy had tried to whitewash "the question of Communist influence or involvement" in Negro rights demonstrations.

Senator Thurmond, in his statement, said there was evidence that Mr. Rustin had been a member of the Young Communist League. He also said the Rustin file included a 1953

morality Mr. Rustin said, "I am disinclined to put myself in the position to defend my own moral character."

Senator Thurmond said Mr. Rustin served 28 months in prison during World War II

FREEDOM FLEET ORGANIZED FOR MARCH ON WASHINGTON

NEW YORK (UPI) — A massive "Freedom Fleet" of buses, trains and airliners was being assembled Thursday for the Aug. 28 march on Washington.

Civil rights leaders expect to transport more than 100,000 persons from all parts of the nation to Washington to demonstrate in support of President Kennedy's civil rights bill in Congress.

"We will have far beyond 100,000 persons. No one knows for

sure how many more," said A. Phillip Randolph, president of the Negro American Labor Council and march chairman.

Leaders have arranged with police in the nation's capital for parking space for 2,173 at the Washington Monument.

In addition, it is planned to charter at least 14 special trains and five airliners for what could
